RE: Transboundary Rivers - British Columbia Large-Scale Mining in the Headwaters of Southeast Alaska Rivers

In advance of U.S./Canada bilateral meetings this week, I respectfully request that you review the following:

- More than 110 Alaskan fishing, Tribal, business, and municipal leaders have signed a letter to Secretary of State John Kerry, dated April 18, 2016. These leaders ask that Secretary Kerry invoke the Boundary Waters Treaty and request an International Joint Commission reference for the Taku, Stikine and Unuk rivers shared by the U.S. and Canada in the face of large-scale mining development in this transboundary region of Southeast Alaska and Northwest British Columbia. Additionally, over 40 municipalities, businesses, tribal entities and organizations have submitted resolutions and letters in the last few years that formally request action by the U.S. Department of State in this matter.
- A petition currently calls on Secretary Kerry to protect Southeast Alaska's \$2 billion-per-year fishing and tourism industries and way of life that are critically tied to the U.S./Canada transboundary rivers. To date, this petition has generated almost 18,000 signatures.
- Alaska-based professional research and consulting firm, McDowell Group, has prepared a brief <u>memo</u> with preliminary findings of their forthcoming report, "Southeast Alaska Transboundary Watersheds: Economic Impact Analysis." *This memo is not for distribution*.
